President's Letter

The alchemists understood the return to chaos as an essential part of the opus. It was the stage of the nigredo and moritificatio, which was then followed by the "purgatorial fire" and the albedo. The spirit of chaos is indispensable to the work, and it cannot be distinguished from "the gift of the Holy Ghost," any more than the Satan of the Old Testament can be distinguished from Yahweh. The unconscious is both good and evil, and yet neither, the matrix of all potentialities.

It is from need and distress that new forms of existence arise, not from idealistic requirements or wishes.

We find ourselves in the middle of the 2020s with a felt sense of chaos, disorder, and upheaval in the collective. The spirit of the times feels like an era of chaos and undoing. Many feel that fear, cruelty, incivility, darkness, and despair have settled over our country. This *nigredo* state does portend the death of ideals many have held dear. When we approach the world symbolically, death represents transformation rather than finality. Fundamental change is upon us, and as Heracitus informed us, change is the only constant. But what kind of change will it be? C. G. Jung reminds us:

In reality, only a change in the attitude of the individual can bring about a renewal in the spirit of the nations. Everything begins with the individual.

There are well-meaning theologians and humanitarians who want to break the power principle—in others. We must begin by breaking it in ourselves. (CW 10, para. 45–46)

Our upcoming Community Programs year begins in September, under the guidance of our program chairperson, Carol Dieckman. Fall in-person programs range from "Ancient Greek Mystery Rites and the Ethics of Individuation" to "Being with the Body in Depth Psychology," along with the annual November political panel.

ANCIENT GREEK MYSTERY RITES AND THE ETHICS OF INDIVIDUATION



Χαίρε παθών τὸ πάθημα τὸ δ' οὐπω προσθ' ἔπεπόνθεις
Θεὸς ἐγένου ἐξ ἀνθρώπου ἐριφός ἐς γάλα ἔπετες

*Greetings, you who have suffered the Suffering, like you never
did before.*

Out of a mortal, you have become a god.

A kid, you fell into milk.

This text is an example of many found inscribed on gold leaves and placed in the hands or mouths of the dead who were Bacchic or Orphic initiates. In this presentation we will explore what is known about the ancient Greek mysteries, including group ritual practices and also initiation rituals of a voluntary, secret, and personal character that aimed at personal transformation through a transcendent experience of the sacred. For over 2,000 years, these rites promised

to teach initiates that death was not a curse, but a blessing. We will explore the relevance of the mysteries for understanding our own processes of initiation and individuation, in which we approach functional immortality by means of our conscious suffering, experiences of ecstasy, and personal encounter with the Divine. The goals of initiation differ from the goals of other kinds of psychotherapy, posing different ethical implications. Understanding the symbols and patterns of initiation can illuminate the individuation journey, and enlighten, enliven and deepen analytic work.

In Saturday's workshop, we will discover the Egyptian roots of the initiation rites and the symbols common to both. We will then delve into the rich visual symbols in the Villa of Mysteries in Pompeii. Finally, we will explore how these rites resonate with our own mysteries of individuation. We will also explore the clinician's ethical considerations involved in this kind of in-depth work.

**BEING WITH THE BODY IN DEPTH PSYCHOLOGY: TRAUMA AND ITS
TRANSFORMATION IN THE UNSPOKEN REALM**

The body is a portal to the numinous dimensions of the soul's life—to healing and wholeness that goes far beyond just the relief of traumatic symptoms, leading to a greater access to feelings and a renewed sense of soulful aliveness.

Jungian Analysis and Depth Psychology turn toward the deepest currents of the soul, where dreams and life experiences take on cohesive wisdom and unfold in ways that orient and guide the individual. The ancestors knew this—shamans, healers, medicine people, and spiritual teachers looked to dreams, visions, and synchronicities to guide the individual. They knew that these often spoke not just to the individual but were messages that also offered guidance to the community. This realm Jung called “the Spirit of the Depths.” Here one can re-connect with oneself and our collective body—consciously— rather than perpetuating the unconscious group-think that is characteristic of “the Spirit of the Times.”



Much of the current research in trauma studies and neuroscience points to the primary significance of the body in accessing and working through developmental wounds that constellate complex trauma. This presentation will explore how the body remembers the affective reverberations of trauma, not in conceptual form, but more like a musical phrase; an affective pattern that gets relived and repeated. To experience the body in Depth Psychotherapy is to enter the non-conceptual world, where meaning arises from direct experience, and the nonverbal dimension of the archetype is felt.

In Saturday's workshop, we will further this exploration through experiential practices, including Authentic Movement, to discover how the mythopoetic reality revealed in Depth Psychotherapeutic process weaves the experience of the body into a tapestry of personal meaning, facilitating deep transformation.

POLITICAL PANEL: PSYCHOLOGIZING IN THE AGE OF CORRUPTION



Over the last year we have struggled to remain consciously engaged in a discussion of what Jung called “these times.” We have entertained the complexes, cultural and personal, at work and the inexorable trend toward corruption amidst the barrage of words and images meant to demand we submit to an ever-narrowing world view.

While the center of our national stage is occupied by one character, we have attempted to cast our net wider and deeper, looking for what our era has constellated. We have explored the tyranny and threat to women and the feminine, the consequences for Nature and the human community, and for individual meaning amidst a flood of shadow-driven emotions, personal animus, not to mention our normal human tendency toward dissociation and denial.

We have continued to use our imaginal and analytic tools on the underlying dynamism of the psyche—of the shadow, the mythic representations of Mercurius, as well as attacks on linking, both within and without. Additionally, we have wondered about the predominance of left brain reasoning, at the cost of right-brain feeling, to address our current crises.

Amidst it all we contend with our unsettling feelings of rage and hopelessness while holding the possibility for change. What, we ask, is the fate of love and eros in such a time?

Depth Psychology, emphasizing the symbolic and imaginal, engages the underlayment of our cultural and political life. We will again each offer a brief topic salient to our situation. These presentations will be followed by an inter-panel discussion and time for questions and comments from the audience. We hope you will join us.

ANDEAN SHAMANISM IN PSYCHOANALYSIS AND PSYCHOTHERAPY

This webinar presentation is an exploration of the Andean codes, first introduced by the Incan civilization in relation to psychoanalytic theory, woven together with concepts from fractal dynamics and quantum theory to provide a more comprehensive method in psychoanalytic practice. It examines parallels between the intricate interweaving of Andean principles and the layered complexity of consciousness within a therapeutic setting. The integration of Andean shamanic medicine in psychoanalysis practice offers a framework for dropping into a felt sense of intuitive knowing with deeper sensitivity, while navigating less differentiated areas of the client's inner world of implicit experience inner world, often the depository for unprocessed trauma.

IN-EXPERIENCE: A STUDY OF INDIVIDUATION IN THE POETRY OF E.E. CUMMINGS



Individuation, defined by Carl Jung as “coming to selfhood, or self-realization” (CW7, para 266), is the heart of any Jungian analytic process and is the essence of Jung’s approach to psychological life. This presentation tells the story of E.E. Cummings’ extraordinary biography through selected poems that seem to reflect the heart of his individuation process from early childhood until his death, and which mirror many of Jung’s ideas about the psyche.

The study of poetry can serve to heighten our awareness of metaphor, the underlying layers of meaning, and the articulation of affective states which communicate the patient’s emotional truth in the context of clinical work. Inspired by the creative use of language in Cummings’ poetry, we will explore the paradox between embracing “in-experience” as a way to live more fully “in to” experience, and the implications this holds for analytic practice.

FRANKENSTEIN AND THE EGO-SELF AXIS: A JUNGIAN EXPLORATION OF CREATION, SHADOW, AND SOUL

This public program uses the 2025 Oscar-nominated film *Frankenstein* as a contemporary myth to explore core Jungian concepts and their relevance to psychological development and modern life. Through a Jungian lens, *Frankenstein* becomes more than a story of scientific ambition; it is a powerful symbolic narrative about the ego–Self axis, the consequences of unconscious creation, and the deep human longing for relationship, recognition, and soul.



Participants will be invited to reflect on how the film dramatizes the tension between ego consciousness and the Self and how the failure to hold this relationship consciously leads to fragmentation, projection, and destructive enactments. The program will provide an accessible yet depth-oriented introduction to Jungian psychology for the general public while also offering rich material for those already familiar with analytical concepts.

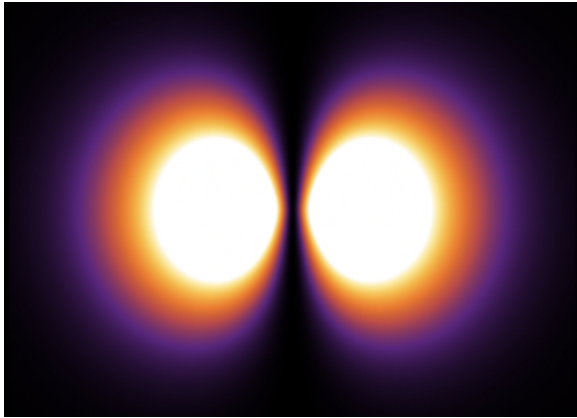

EXPERIENCING THE *UNUS MUNDUS*



The Friday evening lecture explores the *unus mundus*—the unitary world—as Jung’s culminating vision of the individuation process, describing the paradoxical possibility of reaching unity amid periods of opposition. Drawing on Jung’s transformative encounter with the Great Stupa of Sanchi, his intensive exploration of Western alchemy through Gerard Dorn’s work, and his own near-death visions, we examine how the *unus mundus* became for Jung not an abstract metaphysical concept but a lived psychological reality. The presentation traces the Western

alchemical path toward this unitary reality—a Faustian journey fundamentally different from Eastern approaches—and explores synchronicity as its para-psychological equivalent. Through personal dreams and Jung’s conception of “objective cognition,” we discover how direct experience develops into a double vision capable of perceiving both the external sensory world and its hidden depths of meaning, manifesting first in discontinuous flashes of synchronistic insight before consolidating into a lasting enlightenment where one becomes a living vessel for what Jung called the cosmogonic dignity of human consciousness.

In the Saturday workshop, we will explore the profound connections between quantum mechanics, number, and the Self as manifestations of the *unus mundus*—the unitary world underlying both matter and psyche. We will examine the historical relationship between quantum mechanics and alchemy, tracing Jung’s collaboration with Wolfgang Pauli and the principle of uncertainty that links archetypal psychology with modern physics. Through Jung’s late-life reflections on number as the most primitive manifestation of spirit, we will investigate how number functions as an archetype of order, bridging the qualitative and quantitative dimensions of reality. The workshop illuminates these abstract concepts through experiential material. Participants will discover how quantum mechanics, number, and synchronistic experiences converge in the psychological realization of the Self as a living unity transcending the conventional boundaries between inner and outer, subjective and objective reality.

VENGEANCE, RETRIBUTION, AND EPIC FURY: ENCOUNTERING SHADOW AND EVIL IN OUR CURRENT CULTURAL CONTEXT



In the Greek pantheon, the Furies were images of vengeance and retribution who punished humans for crimes against the “natural order.” What is constellated when humans merge with an archetypal energy and then enact it? The Furies are very different from the Fates. To live one’s destiny with an attitude of *Amor Fati* is very different from being possessed by vengeance, Retribution, and Fury, energies that lead to inflation, possession, reckless enactment, and a manifestation of Tragedy.

For Jung, Evil was real. To work authentically in Psyche, we must engage personally with the problem of evil. And yet, Jung tells us that Evil is not quite archetypal because it depends on consciousness for its existence. Shadow and Evil are pre-ethical, yet an authentic, personal ethic is required if one is to engage consciously with these energies. Without the capacity to hold a personal, conscious ethic, individuals and collectives are compelled to enact these energies unconsciously.

The Friday evening lecture will explore Jung’s thoughts on this subject. We will hold Jung’s writings against those of Hannah Arendt, Erich Fromm, Erich Neumann, and Friedrich Nietzsche. We are listening together for authentic wisdom to apply towards conscious living in a troubled world.

The role of amplification is partly as a bridge to consciousness of complexes, both personal and cultural. In the Saturday workshop, we will explore the role of evil and shadow in regard to work with personal and cultural complexes. For Jung, evil is a genuine force in Psyche, yet it requires consciousness for there to be a relational encounter with it. In this work, we must engage with the instincts as they are emergent in Psyche. Then, how do we carry personal integration out into the world of cultural complexes? To be conscious is to be engaged in moral conflict. We need to ask if political engagement can potentially be analytic in attitude. This workshop will be both didactic and experiential and offers an opportunity to make connections to clinical work

Presenter Bios

BARBARA HOLIFIELD, MSW, SEP, is a San Francisco Jungian Analyst who recognizes the body as an intrinsic aspect of psyche. She is a former professor of Somatic Psychology at CIIS and has decades of experience with Somatic Experiencing and Authentic Movement. Whether working with trauma or the nonverbal dimension of the numinous, she incorporates the bodily felt dimension of experience into Jungian work. Her published works include a new book, *Being with the Body in Depth Psychotherapy: Development, Trauma, and Transformation in the Unspoken Realm*.

BARRY WILLIAMS, M.DIV., PSYD, is a Jungian Analyst in private practice in Taos, NM and a member of the C. G. Jung Institute of Santa Fe. For twenty-five years, together with his wife and late son, he has been an initiated *Mara'akame* in the traditional healing path of the *Huichol/Wixarika* people of the Sierra of central Mexico. Dr. Williams' particular interests are in dreams, healing, shamanism and depth psychology, and the archetype of sacrifice.

CHRISTOPHE LE MOUËL, PH.D., trained as a mathematician and quantum physicist in France. Since 2008, he has served as the executive director of the C. G. Jung Institute in Los Angeles, where he lives with his wife and twin boys. He is co-editor-in-chief of the quarterly journal of Jungian thought, *Psychological Perspectives*, and a candidate in training at the Research and Training Centre for Depth Psychology according to C.G. Jung and Marie-Louise von Franz in Zürich. He is also the co-editor of *Conversations with Marie-Louise von Franz on Synchronicity and Numbers: Insights and Amplifications* (2025), published by Inner City Books.

DAVID SOLEM MSW, MAPC, MA, MM, is a diplomate Jungian analyst through IRSJA-IAAP. He is a training analyst on the faculties of the C.G. Jung Institute of Santa Fe, the Memphis-Atlanta Jungian Seminar, and of the Philadelphia Association of Jungian Analysts. His publications appear in *Psychological Perspectives* (2017), *Quadrant* (2018), and the *Journal of Analytical Psychology* (2019 and 2021). David is in private clinical practice in Santa Fe, New Mexico. David is also a classically trained musician and holds the position of principal keyboard (harpsichord, organ, piano) with Santa Fe Pro Musica as well as the position of assistant organist at First Presbyterian Church in Santa Fe, NM.

DEBORAH BRYON, PH.D., is a graduate of UCLA and University of Denver, and diplomate Jungian analyst. For the past twenty-five years, she has integrated her shamanic training as a paqo (Andean shaman) into her psychoanalytic private practice as a psychoanalyst. Deborah is a frequent guest lecturer in the international Jungian community and authored four books and numerous articles on Andean medicine and psychoanalysis.

ESTELA BOBADILLA is a Jungian analyst and founding member of the C. G. Jung Institute of San Diego. Born in Mexico City and raised in San Diego, her life reflects a deep connection to both cultures. She has worked as a therapist for over twenty years, accompanying individuals in their psychological and symbolic development. Her clinical and scholarly interests include the cultural unconscious and the role of the feminine principle in the individuation process.

FRANCES HATFIELD, PH.D, MFT, is a training analyst at the C. G. Jung Institute of Santa Fe, and the C. G. Jung Institute of San Francisco, with a practice in Santa Fe. She was poetry editor of *Jung Journal: Culture and Psyche* from 2018 to 2023, and is the author of a book of poems, *Rudiments of Flight* (Wings Press, 2013). Ongoing Clinical Education and Training

ANALYTIC TRAINING: SEMINARS AND CASE COLLOQUIA

The C. G. Jung Institute of Santa Fe offers analytic training in collaboration with the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts (IRSJA)—which serves as the adjudicating body in the process of certifying diplomate Jungian analysts.

Individuals who wish to apply for Jungian analytic training must be at least 25 years of age, hold a master's degree in mental health or a related field, and be engaged in ongoing analysis. We accept applicants who are not yet licensed as mental health clinicians; however, licensure is a requirement for completing certification as a Jungian analyst. Applications are welcomed from any state in the United States for applicants who are willing to travel to New Mexico (maximum once a month September to May) for in-person training. Once admitted, participants must accrue a minimum of 100 face-to-face hours of personal analysis and hold tenure in the local training program for a minimum of six months before applying to IRSJA.

The Santa Fe Institute invites analytic training applications for the 2027–2028 academic year beginning January 2, 2027. For more information about application, email Frances Hatfield and Jane Penrod at training@santafejung.org. After your email is received, an application form will be sent to you. In addition to a completed application, you must provide a CV and personal statement. There is a \$100.00 non-refundable fee for processing an initial application. The deadline for application is April 1, 2027. The Santa Fe Institute's analytic training program is a closed group. Admission to analytic training is decided following a personal interview with two training analysts. Interviews will be held in May 2027 for admission in September 2027.
